Teacher training, self-training, recharge (to prevent burnout)

Providing realistic education and training opportunities, second chance schools

Active anti-segregation policy (changing student composition)

Extra support for institutions teaching disadvantaged students

The involvement of parents in the activities of schools is no longer unavoidable

Increasing the flexibility and interoperability of educational paths (creating and supporting individual learning paths: creating, developing and connecting school and home learning support system)

Application of modern educational methodologies:

- replacing the frontal method
- group, small group, individual education
